PRINCIPAL COLUMN

Dear Parents, Guardians and Students,

Term 2 has been a very productive term with interschool sports, excursions and lots of learning going on in each learning area.

Our school's curriculum day on Tuesday, June 11th, was dedicated to two pivotal areas outlined in the Annual Implementation Plan: Mathematics and Mental Health and Wellbeing.

In Mathematics we focused on Differentiation which involves teachers differentiating student work based on every students individual need. Here teachers use ongoing formative assessment to find the students zone of proximal development and then plan for each group of learners based on their needs.

Differentiation is one of the researched 'High Impact Teaching Strategies' that has the biggest effect size in student academic improvement.

Mental Health and Wellbeing received significant attention during our curriculum day. Given the considerable time we spend with our students, we often become the first to notice any deviations from their usual behavior. While some behaviors may align with typical developmental stages, others may signal a need for additional support to enhance student learning.

In our professional development sessions, we introduced the new departmental framework of 'High Impact Wellbeing Strategies', which encompass:

- 1. Building Relationships with students
- 2. Facilitating Peer relationships
- 3. Establishing and maintaining classroom expectations
- 4. Supporting Inclusion and belonging
- 5. Fostering student self-efficacy
- 6. Engaging students
- 7. Promoting coping strategies.

Ensuring student learning and wellbeing remains our paramount priority, and we are steadfast in making it the central focus of our ongoing efforts in school life.

PICKING UP STUDENTS

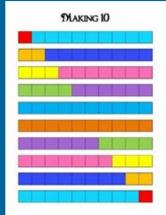

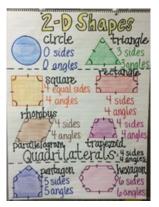
CANTEEN NEWS

FOUNDATION GROWTH LEARNING



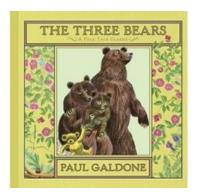


In Numeracy, students in the Foundation area have been engaging in a variety of lessons that have been focusing on partitioning. Students have been enjoying learning how to partition to 10 using unifix blocks. As part of their space topic, the students are engaging in learning about shapes and all of their facts. They are learning language such as face, side and corner. This week the students will engage in sorting activities.









In Literacy, we have been learning all about Fairy Tales. The students have loved being back at school and reading Jack and the Beanstalk, Little red riding hood, Three little pigs and Little red hen, The fisherman and his wife, The frog and the prince, The ugly duckling, The three bears and Three Billy goats gruff. They have been focusing on characters, character traits, settings and events. The students are tracing words and really focusing on where each letter begins and ends. In writing, the students have created their own Fairy Tales by replacing one or two words in the story to make it their own.

In Inquiry, Foundation students are learning about living and non living things through our Inquiry topic of "Its alive" The students are beginning to explore facts about living things and what they are, what they require eg, food, water, air and discovering what is living and what is non living. The students have shared what they know about animals and what they want to find out. This week the students have learnt facts about carnivores, herbivores and omnivores.



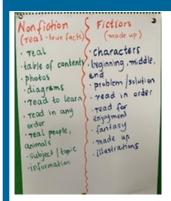

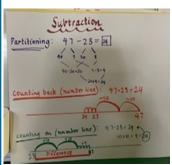
YEAR 1/2 GROWTH LEARNING



In Reading, students have been looking at the difference between fiction and nonfiction texts, and discussing the different text features found in each. Students have explored different nonfiction texts quite extensively, including different genres such as letters, flyers, invitations and information reports. Students have been learning to identify key facts from an information report. They discussed what information was important and why, listed important scientific language used, and why pictures, diagrams and photos are important in these types of texts.



In Writing, students have been exploring different text types, including invitations and letters. Students explored letters in a persuasive form and had to write a formal letter to the principal asking if we could have a dance party at school. Students had to give reasons to support their argument and followed the structure of a formal persuasive letter. Students also began writing their own information text on a chosen Australian animal where they had to include facts on their animals diet, appearance and habitat.





In Maths, students were lucky to attend a fun and engaging Maths Incursion. Students were able to rotate through a series of Maths activities which required them to work out using Mathematical problem thinking skills. In Number sessions, students have been focusing on subtraction and learning how to apply different strategies when solving subtraction problems, including; partitioning, counting back and counting on (using number lines).



In Inquiry, students have continued exploring our unit on 'Light and Sound'. Students have completed tasks on the five senses where they had to sort different pictures into the correct sense. Students in 1/2C have also been researching 'Light and Sound' further using laptops. Students have used Epic as a research tool and played quiz games on 'Blooket' testing their knowledge about the topic in a fun and friendly competitive way.

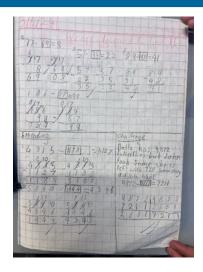

YEAR 3/4 GROWTH LEARNING

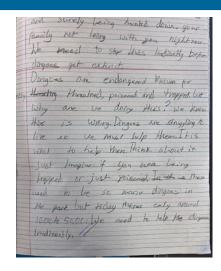


In Maths, the students have been learning Algebra and finding the missing number.

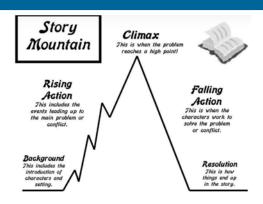

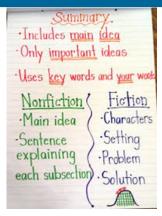
YEAR 5/6 GROWTH LEARNING



In Writing this week, we have been revisiting narrative and creative writing with a focus on enhancing descriptive language, sizzling starts and powerful storylines. The students have been developing narratives based off of an image as a seed. From there students are working towards writing intriguing narratives which follow the story mountain structure to entice the reader. We look forward to reading what the students create.



This is the final week of learning and mastering fractions. Students are consolidating their understanding of the complex topic and starting the complete their 'exit ticket' which indicates their overall understanding. The students have extended their learning through converting improper fractions to mixed, simplifying fractions, finding common denominators, and finally adding and subtracting fractions. The 'Bump It Up' wall will show the clear progression of their learning as we finish up the area of 5A: Azaan Muhammad & Baneen Al Yaaquob learning.



In Reading we have been looking at identifying the main idea. The students have been reading detectives and have been looking for clues in the text to help them understand the main idea of a text or paragraph. This is an essential skill in reading and the students are improving their ability and skills by the day. We really want the students to be reading at home too. The more they read, the more they will know and like anything, practice makes



This is the final weeks of the Inquiry unit before the big showcase in week 11. The students have been busy getting creative, inventive, and technical as they near the end of their creating stage of the unit. VISUAL ART LEARNING



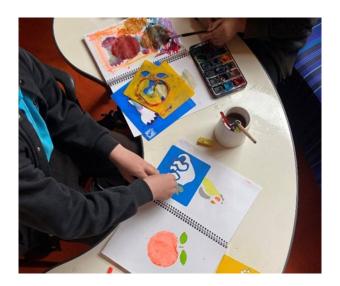
Our Foundation students are exploring 'printing' through stencil art and mono printing techniques using a gelli plate and acrylic paint.

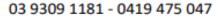

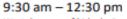
